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'AN ADVOCATE'

- ▶ An Advocate holds a higher value in field of Law and Practice.
- ▶ A lawyer is a Law Graduate, while the Advocate holds the license to practice.
- ▶ Only an Advocate is a Legal Practitioner.
- ▶ The Lawyer is an equally important entity for legal awareness.
- ▶ No other person other than the Advocate has the right to practice before Courts of Law (except with due permission of the court to conduct matter in person)
- ▶ To succeed as a lawyer, a man must work like a horse and live like a hermit - Sir John Scott.
- ▶ An advocate must always work with highest value of dignity.



SEVEN LAMPS OF ADVOCACY – JUSTICE ABBOT PARRY

1. **HONESTY** – Towards Client, work, position and profession
2. **COURAGE** – The will, confidence and compassion to represent
3. **WIT** – Sarcasm, sanity, to bring out natural application of mind
4. **INDUSTRY** – To be diverse, well versed, knowledgeable and to be the Jack of all trades and master of none.
5. **ELOQUENCE** – to be fluent, elegant, persuasive, submissive, straight forward and someone who can make an impact
6. **JUDGEMENT** – like a game of chess, to think about multiple possibilities and outcomes
7. **FELLOWSHIP** – brotherhood towards the legal fraternity.

- **ADVOCATE NOT TO APPEAR IN A MATTER OF HIS PERSONAL FINANCIAL INTEREST** – arising out of a fixed commission, settlement, benefit etc.
- **ADVOCATE TO REFRAIN FROM PRACTICING BEFORE THE BENCH IF IT IS A RELATIVE**
- **NOT TO BE PART OF UNLAWFUL STRIKES CAUSING LOSS TO CLIENT**

DUTIES OF AN ADVOCATE TOWARDS THE CLIENT

- To Accept Briefs and to specifically deny if it is not his expertise
- To finalise fees and structure at the beginning
- Not to withdraw from the case without unreasonable cause
- Not to appear in matters where interest of Advocate lies.
- To disclose the possibilities to the client regarding outcome and not to give false and imaginary hopes.
- To not advice any illegal activities.
- In cases that are compoundable, to advice settlement or route of mediation, Lok – Adalat to the client
- Maintain privacy of matter
- Not to deal in property that arises out of the dispute in which Advocate appears
- Not to represent opposite party in the same matter and alternate matters concerning the client
- To defend the case of the client even if it appears that he is guilty.

DUTIES OF AN ADVOCATE TOWARDS FELLOW ADVOCATES

- Not to advertise work through circulars, advertisements or pamphlets.
- Signboard and Nameplate to be of reasonable size and not to have mention of him being any ex-judge, member of any Bar or holds any position within the Bar Council.
- Not to appear in a pending matter without obtaining prior NOC of existing Advocate on Vakalatnama.
- Not to commit acts of defamation against fellow advocates.
- Any grievances to be raised before Bar Association or Bar Council.
- Not be member of two or more Bar Associations at a time.
- To Adhere by the norms and rules of Bar Council of India.
- Use of Parliamentary disciplined language.
- To assist the bar in authorized strikes.
- To Vote in Bar elections



WHAT IS CONSIDERED A MISCONDUCT? -

In **STATE OF PUNJAB v RAM SINGH** the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, held that the term misconduct may involve moral turpitude, it must be improper or wrong behaviour, unlawful behaviour, wilful in character, a forbidden act, a transgression of established and definite rule of action or code of conduct, but not mere error of judgement, carelessness or negligence in performance of duty.

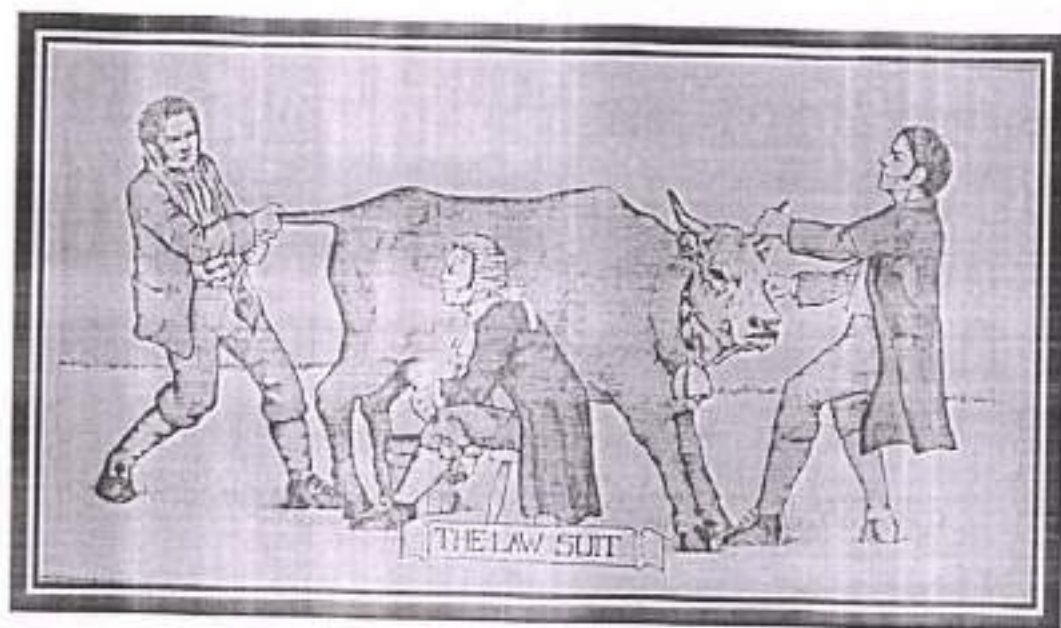

DEFINITIONS

► AUSTIN

- Austin was the first jurist to make jurisprudence as a science. He defines 'jurisprudence' as "the philosophy of positive law." He opines that the appropriate subject to jurisprudence is a positive law i.e. law as it is (existing law). In other words, jurisprudence is not a moral philosophy but it is a scientific and systematic study of the existing, actual and positive law as distinguished from natural, ideal or moral law.

HOLLAND'S DEFINITION

► Holland:

An English Jurist Sir Thomas Erskine Holland defines, Jurisprudence as, "Jurisprudence is the formal science of positive law" According to him jurisprudence should only concern itself with the basic principles of concepts underlying in any natural system of law.



Salmond defines jurisprudence as,
Jurisprudence is the science of the first
principles of the civil law."

What is an open prison?

Rajasthan Prison Rules define open jail as, 'Prisons without walls, bars and locks.' The jail does not confine them completely but requires them to earn their living to support their families, living with them inside the jail.

Right to meet friends and Consult Lawyer

The horizon of human rights is expanding. Prisoner's rights have been recognized not only to protect them from physical ill-treatment or torture in the prison, but also to save them from mental torture.

In the case of Sunil Batra v. Delhi Administration, the Supreme Court recognized the right of the prisoners to be visited by their friends and relatives. The court favoured their visits but subject to search and discipline and normal security interest.

The court observed:

Visits to prisoners by family and friends are a solace in isolation, and only a dehumanized system can derive vicarious delight in depriving prison inmates of this humane amenity.

In Francis Coralie Mullin v. The Administrator, Union Territory of Delhi and others, The Supreme Court ruled that the right to life and liberty includes the right to live with human dignity, and therefore a detainee should be entitled to have interviews with family members, friends and lawyers, without severe restrictions. It was stressed upon the need of permitting the prisoners to meet their friends and relatives. The court held that the prisoner or detainee could not move about freely by going outside the jail and could not socialize with persons outside jail.

The court said that:

Personal liberty would include the right to socialize with members of the family and friends, subject, of course, to any valid prison regulations and under Art. 14 and 21 such prison regulations must be reasonable and non-arbitrary.

In the case of Joginder Kumar v. State of U.P. and others, The court observed that whenever a public servant is arrested that matter should be intimated to the superior officer, if possible, before the arrest and in any case, immediately after the arrest, in cases of members of Armed Forces, Army, Navy or Air Force, intimation should be sent to the officer commanding the unit to which the member belongs. It should be done immediately after the arrest is effected. Under Rule 225 of the Procedure and Conduct of Business in Lok Sabha, when a Member is arrested on a criminal charge or is detained under an executive order of the Magistrate, the executive authority must inform without delay in writing to the Speaker. As soon as any arrest, detention, prosecution or release is effected intimation should invariably be sent to the Government concerned concurrently with the intimation sent to the Speaker. (1) Chairman of the Executive Assembly/Council of Ministers in Lok Sabha.

National Seminar on “Sports Law in India: Issues & Challenges” & National Bill Analysis Competition 5th and 6th March 2018.

About the Seminar

Not only in India but globally, legal regulation of sporting world has become extremely necessary. Sports are played at national and international levels. General Assembly of United Nations has adopted resolution 58/5, which recognises sport and physical education as a means to promote education, health, development and peace. Sports also promote careers and entertainments leading to requirement of regularly measures.

Sports law is an amalgam of laws that apply to athletes and the sports they play. It is not a single legal topic with generally applicable principles. Sports law touches on a varieties of matter including contract, tort, trade mark, agency, antitrust, constitutional law, labour, sex discrimination, criminal and tax issues. There is a huge interest in sports, both on and off the field. The growing media coverage of highly paid athletics, advertising endorsement has let to various legal issues surrounding the sports industry. Sports law is a vital part to sports. There need to be a strong presence of good governance and someone to uphold the rules of game when they come into disrepute.

This National Seminar was organized as an endeavour towards focusing these gray areas related to sport and law. We hope its outcome will be in the interest and benefit of stakeholders such as sport persons, sports organisations, regulatory bodies, lawyers, numerous sport loving Indians and overall development of sports law jurisprudence.



Sub-themes

Dispute resolution in Sports in India

The nature of dispute in Sports is different and it needs a special approach to resolve amicably. Traditional courts are incapable to resolve sports disputes from that perspective, and more importantly they cannot decide the dispute in speedy manner. Resolving a dispute in a very short stipulated time is what expected from dispute resolution system. Variety of disputes can occurred in sports such as issues related to its governance, purely commercial, contractual, disciplinary, discrimination and few are even of a quasi-criminal nature. India needs to have a mechanism with well framed regulations to resolve sports dispute.

Present Regulatory Governance and issues

The current Indian model of sports governance has various stakeholders such as the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, the Indian Olympic Association, the State Olympic Associations, the National Sports Federation and the Sports Authority of India with well defined roles. Sports Associations are not free from allegations of politics, miss governance, discrimination, corruption and so on. The issue of 'governance' needs to be studied on the backdrop of Supreme Court intervention and its decision of appointing 'Committee of Administrators' (COA), which currently running the administration of the national cricket body.

Anti-doping measures

'International Convention against Doping in Sport' in the year 2005 represents the first time that governments around the world have agreed to apply the force of international law to anti-doping. India ratified the said convention on 10th September, 2007. This is important because there are specific areas where only governments possess the means to take the fight against doping forward.

Legal Approach towards Sports in India

In recent years, the State efforts are visible in the form of appointing committees such as Justice Mudgal Committee and draft Bills such as 'National Sports Development Bill, 2013', The National Sports Ethics Commission Bill, 2016, The National Sports University Bill, 2017 etc. Legal framework will provide crucial support in the overall development of sports in India. Considering the complexity involved, we must check the feasibility of having legislation, covering all the legal issues related to sports.

Conduct Of Sessions

Dispute resolution in Sports in India

Resource Person: Shri. Shivam Singh, Advocate, Supreme Court of India, New Delhi

Shri. Shivam Singh inaugurated the Seminar and Bill Analysis Competition. In this session, he elaborated on nature of disputes in sports with live examples. He also gave an overview of role of a law and advocate in resolving sports dispute. He explained how arbitration can be used to resolve sports disputes.

Present Regulatory Governance and issues

Resource Person: Shri. Uday Warunjikar, Sr. Advocate, Bombay High Court, Mumbai.

Shri. Warunjikar spoke on the various issues affecting the sports association such as politics, miss governance, discrimination, corruption and hence there is a need to have strong regulatory governance in the field of sports law. He also focused on Australian model and suggested to have similar mechanism in India.

Anti-doping measures

Resource Person: Mr. Nitin Mittal, Associate, Krida-Legal, New Delhi

Mr. Mittal in this session explained and analysed the meaning of word 'anti-doping'. First he gave few real life examples how doping (drugs) affects the athletes and the reputation of the country and dealt with anti-doping measures. He also spoke on international conventions, India's obligations and NADA. He elaborated on the statutory procedural aspect in detailed manner.

Legal Approach towards Sports in India

Resource Person: Mr. Vidusphat Singhania, Partner, Krida-Legal, New Delhi

Mr. Singhania, who was one of the members of drafting committee of National Sport Development Bill 2013, discussed the efforts taken by the State for taking Sports law seriously and by appointing various committees and drafting bills such as National Sport Development Bill 2013, the National Sports Ethics Commission Bill 2016 and National Sports University Bill 2017. He spoke on the differences and the effects of the bills.

Valedictory Session:



The National Seminar and Bill Analysis Competition were concluded with the valedictory session. Valedictory session was presided over by Chief Guest, Mr. Vidusphat Singhania, Partner, Krida-Legal, New Delhi, and Dr. Rohini Honap, Principal.

Seminar Report 2017-18

Seminar on "Better Policing" (In association with PCGT)

The one-day Seminar on "Better Policing" on 30 January 2018 in association with PCGT highlighted what ails the police force. Some of these issues are political interference, leadership issues, bad working conditions, low salaries, mismanagement etc. But the most problematic but least talked about ailment of Policing is corruption which further causes anarchy and injustice.

Mr. Prakash Singh Spokes about the Law-and-Order division of Police looks after the law and order situation in a particular area. All illegal activities – bars, shops, restaurants, illegal joints etc. pay money on a regular basis, to this division. One of the main causes for the anarchy we see in the system is due to this department.

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presence of good governance and someone to uphold the rules of game when they come into disrepute.

Since the interest in actual crime, either to prevent or to detect the crime is very low, a system called Burking is employed by the police. Whenever a crime takes place and the complainant comes to report, the crime is not properly recorded. Therefore, crimes are deliberately suppressed in the records.

Investigation requires a lot of time, patience, and hard work. Not only are more personnel required for the investigation, but they have to be trained and mentored on the job to do a professional investigation. Lack of professional investigation results in lower conviction rates. Burking, misuse of powers, corruption in policing – must be dealt with severe rules, laws, and a judicial system.

The Supreme Court has thus given directives based on the reforms suggested in the National Police Commission's report. In a nutshell, the state governments are directed to constitute a State Security Commission to ensure that the state government does not exercise pressure on the police. Also Ensure that the Director General of Police is appointed through a transparent process and set up a Police Establishment Board, which will decide all transfers, postings, promotions and other service-related matters of police officers.

However, all these directives of the Supreme Court have either – not been implemented by the state governments or they are not implemented properly. Another aspect of better policing is that it should be more Citizen Friendly. It is not the public who have to go to the police, but it is the other way round wherein it is the Police who have to reach the public. With regular interaction, such problems can either be resolved or contained. Citizen-friendly police will also help in getting criminal intelligence, either to prevent it or solve it.

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Many other problems also plague our rivers today, from inefficient governance, urban apathy, dearth of affordable sewage treatment technologies, to alienation of communities from their life lines. New entrants and supposed panacea to urban river problems are river beautification or riverfront development projects. They cost big money and need big time. And, they also need big water. Like the ambitious Sabarmati Riverfront project which gets its water from the dammed Narmada.

Our Second resource person Mr. Manish Ghorpade talks about river restoration and navigation project is being planned in Pune and before it is formally accepted, it seems that it is receiving special favors from the Pune Municipal Corporation. Rather than focusing strongly on river restoration and pollution control, this project, which is said to receive funds earmarked by JNNURM for river restoration, is focusing more on Navigation. The works, which include large scale channelization of the river, seem to be at cross purposes with restoration.

The Pune Municipal Corporation has commenced work on comprehensive design of the Pune River Development Project. This project will prevent the environmental degradation of Pune's Rivers, protect them from being choked by development, reduce the threat of flooding, create a public realm along the river and provide Pune with a vital riverfront that enriches life in the city.

A conference on 'Urban rivers of Maharashtra', inaugurated by environmentalist Madhav Gadgil, harped on the need for a National Urban Water Policy to tackle encroachments and flooding and boost riverfront development. The two-day conference is being organized by INTACH (Indian National Trust for Art and Cultural Heritage), Pune Chapter, and SANDRP (South Asian Network on Dams, Rivers and People). The session focuses on pollution, battles and campaigns, and the way forward with focus on key messages, networking and action needed.

The main aim of the workshop is to strengthen the efforts of communities, individuals and groups against river pollution and river encroachments, understand legal provisions, governance and institutions related to rivers, study the possible impact of 'urbanisation' or 'development' on rivers; understand the impact of interventions like 'river front development' and 'commercial navigation' and deliberate on urban water and river policy, among others. But policies are not sufficient to achieve.

1. "Constitution Day Celebrations": 26th November 2021

The Seminar was graced by eminent lawyers, Cyber Experts and distinct luminaries from the field of Cyber Laws.

The Sub- themes of the Seminar were: Understanding Privacy Laws, National and International Regime covering Privacy laws, Evidence, Crime Investigation and Cyber Forensics, Journey through Case Laws

Day 1: 6th May 2022.

Shri Jayram Paygude, Police Inspector, Traffic Division, Pune (Former Cyber Cell, Police) was the Chief Guest of the Webinar, who gave his best wishes for the Webinar

Session I: Adv. Rajesh Pingle, International Cyber Law Expert addressed the students on “Data Privacy in the 21st Century.” He shared the practical story about how data privacy is very sensitive and subject to greater risks.

Session II: Adv. H B Keshava, a Cyber Law Expert dealt in with “International Regime dealing with Data Privacy”. It was absolutely a fascinating comparative study that he took students through. He was absolutely thorough with his subject.

Day 2: 7th May 2022.

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Free Legal Aid Clinic

Free Legal Aid Clinic of DES Shri. Navalmal Firodia Law College has been established as per the Rules on Standards of Legal Education and Recognition of Degrees (BCI Education Rules, 2008). The Legal Aid Clinic basically serves the purpose of providing legal aid and advice not with the aim of earning profit but in General Public Interest. The College aims to provide access to justice for the poor, disadvantaged or unorganized groups. We provide a wide range of expertise in the matters relating to divorce, property, taxation, women's rights, environmental protection, child welfare, labour issues, rights of differently abled persons, etc.

Keeping in line with the concept of Pro Bono Publico, DES SNFLC has undertaken to uphold the cause of social justice by creating awareness amongst the weaker sections with regard to their rights, legal predicaments, etc. Actualizing this pledge, we have Legal Aid Clinic imparting clinical legal education to the students.

Legal aid denotes legal assistance to needy and indigent persons and legal literacy is the endeavour for creating legal awareness, in tow with maxim Ignorantia Facit Doth Excusat. Ignorantia Juris Non Excusa - Ignorance of fact may be excused, ignorance of law, shall not be.

Aim & Objectives

The Legal Aid Clinic has following aims and objectives:

- To provide free legal aid and advice to the poor and disadvantaged sections of the society
- To provide an arrangement so that machinery of administration of justice becomes easily accessible and within reach of those who have no means to resort to it.
- To spread legal awareness through legal aid camps and street plays
- To organise Legal Literacy Programmes
- To promote Alternative Dispute Resolution mechanism
- To assist the people seeking interpretation of law orders, notices, awards and judgments



- To give practical experience to students while dealing with actual cases handled by the Clinic as a part of Clinical Legal Education.
- To help the students develop and realize their professional and social responsibility.
- To provide para-legal services like drafting affidavits, assisting in registration of marriages, births and deaths, preparation of electoral rolls and filling out various other type of forms, etc.

Modalities of Working

The Legal Aid Clinic has following modalities:

Legal Aid and Advice -Legal Aid Clinic offers legal aid and advice in legal matters to the poor and needy person.

Amicable Settlement of Disputes -Legal Aid Clinic also strives to settle the disputes through counselling, negotiation, mediation and conciliation, etc. Alternative Dispute Resolution mechanisms

Legal Literacy Programs -Legal literacy camps are conducted in rural areas and slums to spread legal awareness through lectures, street plays, posters exhibition, etc.

Para-legal services -The clinic provides para-legal services free of cost like drafting affidavits, assisting in registration of marriages, births and deaths, preparation of electoral rolls and filling out various other type of forms, etc.

Anti-Ragging Campaign is conducted through street plays in several Colleges and hostels.

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Report of the DES Internship Programme 2019-20

Right to meet friends and Consult Lawyer

The function of human rights is to protect the person's rights have been recognized and endow protect them from physical duress or torture in the prison but also to save them from mental torture.

In the case of State Barisal v. Deyan and others, the Supreme Court recognized the right of the prisoners to be visited by their friends and relatives. The court observed that visits that subject to search and discipline and other security matters.

The court observed that visits to prisoners by family and friends are a feature of civilization and only a dehumanized system can deprive humans dignity or depriving human nature of this humane aspect.

In Francis Coraie Mullin v. The Administrator, Union Territory of Delhi and others, The Supreme Court ruled that the right to see and meet friends and relatives is a part of the right to life and liberty and therefore a detainee would be entitled to have interviews with family members, friends and lawyers without having to wait for a long time. The court held that the attorney or advocate could not move about freely by going outside the jail and could not associate with persons outside jail.

The court said that:

Personal liberty would include the right to associate with members of the family and friends subject, of course, to any valid prison regulations and under Art. 14 and 21 such prison regulations must be reasonable and non-arbitrary.

In the case of Joginder Kumar v. State of U.P. and others, The court observed that whenever a prison servant is arrested that matter should be submitted to the superior officer, if possible, before the arrest and in any case, after being taken to the prison or place of detention of arrested person. Any delay or non-compliance should be sent to the officer constituting the unit to which the member belongs, it could be done some days after the arrest of arrested person. Rule 29 of the procedure and conduct of Business in the Sabha, when a person is arrested and a criminal charge is laid against him under a section of the Magistrate, the police authority must inform without delay a relative of the prisoner. As a rule, any arrest, detention or conviction or release of arrested person should be made on reports of the Government officers. Consequently, any person arrested should be the speed with which the family and friends are informed.

- Visit to Yerawada jail was arranged to know what are the lacunas in getting the bail for petty offenders. The conclusion of the Jail Visit is that, many of the offenders could not get legal aid due to various reasons, so they could not file a bail application in the court, and stuck in the jail even for petty offences.
- Research was conducted in the Legislative provisions for women prisoners and living conditions of Women prisoners, the adequacy of the available legal provisions and implementation of the provisions by the prison authorities were analyzed. Additions and amendments were suggested through Model Prison manual. The draft has been sent for the consideration of Honourable Member of Parliament.
- The research was conducted by LRC members 'Recommendations for Jail Reform Regarding Women Prisoners'. The suggestions were made by the LRC members to be added in Prison Manual 2016 for the betterment of management of jail and safety of women prisoners.
- Aditya Bendre conducted research in RERA Laws with the aid and assistance of LRC members. After considerable literature review and discussions with the expertise few publications are made on RERA Law at national and international level. The Data collection has been initiated and field work is undertaken to reach the stakeholders.
- Research was also initiated in Sanitary Legislation, concerns and conditions in India . The proposal was submitted by Gayatri Kulkarni , the empirical work is initiated in association with NGO working in the area , which will be followed by analysis the research is proposed to be completed in month of June.
- An Innovative Proposal was made by Niyati Shah to research and analyse DNA Based Technology Bill, 2017, LRC has accepted the proposal and the research has been conducted.
- A thorough research was conducted in Sports Law emphasizing on aspects like Anti-doping rules, Protection to the Sportsperson and Regulation of Sports sector. Accordingly the proposal was made to college to take up the subject for Seminar. LRC members also made presentation based on the preliminary research.

Research is one of the prominent activities in any educational institute. Its importance in a law school can never be overlooked. No matter what areas of law a student wishes to pursue his career in, Legal Research lies at the core of it. Keeping this in mind, the college has a Legal Research Cell (L.R.C.) which primarily focuses on building the research abilities of the students under the guidance of faculty members and experienced luminaries.

The L.R.C. is constituted through a multi-tier selection process which ensures that innovation, curiosity, novelty and dedication are the qualities essential to be a member. Essay and Interview rounds were conducted to screen the interested students and test their abilities. Consequently, the selected students were divided into two categories, one being for core research activities and the other being for assistance in the allied activities. A formal structure consisting of Coordinators and Group Leaders was laid down for the efficient functioning of the cell. Weekly meetings were held on Wednesdays and the details were recorded. The LRC provided members opportunities to participate in paper publications, presentations at conferences, training activities, seminars and series of lectures on research methodologies. All of this gave an impetus to establishing a research culture in the college.

The Legal Research Cell also hosted 9th National Seminar and Judgment Analysis Competition on the 1st & 2nd of February, 2019. The theme of this year's edition of the Competition was Intellectual Property Rights in general and Industrial Designs in specific and the judgments to be analyzed were:

Nomination process & Selection process:

Legal Research Cell for academic year 2019-20 commenced its work by nominating the members of LRC in July 2019. With 10 nominated members the selection process was planned and executed efficiently. After the selection of nominated members, the selection process of selecting members for LRC has been conducted. The criteria which decided were 'Article analysis'. The students were supposed to choose any article on any aspect of Environmental Law and make review of that article on the basis of given points. The selection process includes the article review and the interview which was conducted by faculty coordinator Dr. Madhushree Joshi madam. Students were enthusiastic for being part of LRC and came for interview in huge numbers. In the selection process 40 students were selected from 65 students as members of LRC for academic year 2019-20. According to selection process, the Legal Research Cell 2019-20 has been formed with the nominated members and selected members and the meeting of all the members has been conducted to discuss and review the plans of LRC.

The yearly activity proposal and the budget for 2019-2020 was proposed and presented before CDC and has been duly approved. Aditya Bendre assisted the coordinators to prepare the presentation and PPT. The activities for the whole year were conducted and reviewed according to this plan.

LRC meetings and Sessions:

In first few meetings the various sub-departments were formed with a view of harmonious and simplified work. Maintaining the enthusiasm of students to take part in various competitions and activities, LRC initiated with the in-house Bill analysis sessions, Legal Updates, Latest judicial pronouncements etc.

The regular meetings for a specified 30 minutes on every Thursday made LRC work in a structured way. Understanding the students' other interests and following the college policy of providing maximum opportunity of participation LRC meetings were conducted by making all

required adjustments. This facilitated LRC members with holistic application of research methods in all possible allied activities. The record of the meeting is appropriately maintained.

The work shop has been conducted on Research Methodology. On the basis of the training imparted the LRC members were expected to experiment on the application of research method and various techniques of Data collection and analysis etc to learn and practise research.

Research orientation for first year students:

An orientation session for first year students relating to the work of LRC was conducted. In this orientation these students were informed about LRC, how LRC works and importance of LRC. Due to CET schedule and delayed Admission process The first year student could participate in the LRC activities only in the 2nd term.

Bill Analysis Sessions :

The Orientation session was conducted by Dr. Madhushree Joshi Ma'am explaining the concept and importance of bill analysis and the methods of analysis to be followed while analysing the bill.

Bill analysis on protection of child from sexual offences bill, 2019:

The first bill analysis session was organized on POCSO Amendment Bill of 2019, held on 10th of August, 2019. The Power Point presentation by Surbhi Agrawal on the said bill highlighted the important provisions made of the bill. The discussion was restricted to the Legal aspects of the bill in order to know the legal nuances of this newly drafted Law. After the presentation, participants put forth their views on the bill. Immense knowledge and command of Adv. Yashpal Purohit sir over the said subject gave us new possibilities as to how to cover various other scenarios for effective implementation of the said act.

Bill Analysis on The Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation Bill, 2019:

The second bill analysis session was conducted on "The Jammu and Kashmir Reorganisation, 2019" which was held on 24th of August, 2019. This session took place in presence of all Legal Research Cell members and also non-members of Legal Research Cell. The session started with Asst.Prof.Sonali Jadhav Madam explaining the concept and importance of bill, the historical background of Article 370 and current scenario after passing of Jammu and

Kashmir Reorganisation Act, 2019. For this session the Power Point Presentation by Adrian Abbi informed the audience about various aspects of the bill.

Legal News and Bill Updates:

This is another regular activity of LRC. The information pertaining to latest legal news, amendments, Judgments etc. is uploaded on the LRC WhatsApp group. The task is undertaken by Sahil Ambre, Surbhi Agrawal, Nagbhushan Hanagandi and Eesha Karnik. The monthly news and bill update reports have been submitted by the concerned students.

New avenues of legal research – Lecture series:

With a view to inform the students about the new avenues of research, LRC is proposing to conduct the lecture series on various fields of legal research where the experts in that field will give the expert advice about the research to the students. The Lecture Series is proposed to be conducted for the first year student in the month of April - May.

CCI Advocacy Skill at DES's SNFLC:

This new proposed venture is a scheme declared by CCI, India, LRC has proposed to conduct awareness sessions and orientation programme, to seek CCI association and monetary assistance and permission to use their name and certification for the same, the proposal has been made the positive reply is awaited.

CID Research Project MOU:

Our College has collaborated with Criminal Investigation Department, Pune to research on the cases provided by the department. College has successfully signed a MOU for conducting a research and submitting case analysis every month. Dr. Madhushree Joshi has coordinated the activity throughout in research as well in communicating with the CID authorities. The confidentiality of the case at hand has been absolutely maintained by the members.

LRC members study the legal aspects of the case-sheet, the judgment and order of the court. Without letting the case copy to the students the informative sessions are conducted by the coordinator to personally explain the case facts and findings with reasons given by the court. The research work is conducted in groups of 5 LRC members.

We received 6 cases out of which case analysis of Four cases has been successfully complete. This activity has explored for the researchers the practical aspects and the procedures of court cases as well as investigation by the police department.

LRC members conducted the research in this new avenue of Technology based Law. The unexplored part of Legal aspects of nuclear technology was suggested for National Seminar of the College- titled as '*AGNISHIKHA- Nuclear Power for Future India*'. The research was further extended as per the subthemes of Seminar.

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Legal Research Cell (A.Y.2020-21)

Legal research is a very important tool for individual lawyers and law firms irrespective of their practice areas. It involves basic search for landmark cases governing the issues in question. Legal research, though sounds simple, is not an easy job. The skill to conduct legal research is indispensable for lawyers, regardless of area or type of practice. With this view, the Legal Research Cell (LRC) of our college works relentlessly to guide the students and mentor them whenever needed. Dr. Priya Chopde, assisted by Asst. Prof. Pooja Baghel were given this responsibility to head the Legal research Cell in the academic year 2020-2021.

Owing to the Covid -19 Pandemic, there were certain constraints that the faculty coordinators and the members faced. For the very first time, in these unprecedented times, the legal research cell was getting acquainted with working online.

Nomination & Selection Process:

A new trend that we initiated and experimented within the academic year 2020-2021 is unlike past years. This year LRC did not have any selection process. The idea behind this was to let every student of the college be served with equal opportunity to represent themselves as the members of LRC.

The membership of LRC was made open to all without any stringent and water tight criterions. As a result, we saw more than hundred students registering themselves in LRC.

The registration process was simply done by sharing a Google form in which we asked students to cite their reason for the inclination towards joining the legal research cell. We were amazed to know that many students were keen on learning the concepts of legal research, its importance and the methodology to do it.

Mode of Working:

In order to have smooth working, LRC conducted regular meetings with the students owing to the Projects undertaken. LRC functions and communicates to students online through the medium of Whatsapp where in a group named "JIDHNYASA" has been formed. Regular updates relating to LRC work is communicated to the students via this

group. The first step taken by the LRC was to coordinate with its core members, i.e. the students who have been part of LRC for a long time and to arrange an orientation session for the new members of LRC. This time LRC consisted of pre-law students too who had brief knowledge about the legal setup. LRC's senior coordinators undertook an introduction session for them, wherein the basic functioning of LRC was explained. The Faculty Coordinators also spoke about the importance of legal research, encouraging the students to participate and undertake research works as much as they can.

Projects Undertaken:

Despite the Pandemic, LRC could take up one major project and one National Level Competition, namely;

1. DRAFT BILL PREPARATION

Students of LRC worked relentlessly for months to be able to submit to the college a draft bill addressing the Pandemic situation and the incapability and shortcomings of the existing "The Epidemics Act, 1897" as well as "The Disaster Management Act, 2005" as also the inadequacy of various other laws in outfitting the pandemic situation. The bill worked on was named as, "THE PANDEMIC PREPAREDNESS, PREVENTION AND PROTECTION BILL, 2021". This bill was further presented to the Deccan Education Society for further action. It is hoped to reach the Law Commission of India as a contribution from the Deccan Education Society. This project would not have been completed if not for the students and the wonderful team we created.

Every year, our college publishes its annual magazine named "Swa-DES". The magazine comprises - annual reports of various departments, clubs, cells and other college activities; achievements of our students and faculty members; and write-ups - articles, essays, poems, and stories contributed by our students, teachers and alumni. 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Bombay High Court Visit

A study tour to Bombay High Court's principal bench at Mumbai was organised by the college on 31st January 2019. When this visit was announced all students were very much excited, fascinated and looking forward to it eagerly. 40 students registered for the Bombay High Court Visit.

Our excitement was doubled when we travelled by Deccan Queen with Prof. Sudhir Tarote sir, Prof. Priya Dhanokar Mam and Prof. Saurabh Ubale sir.

After reaching the Court, we met Sr. advocate Mr. Udaykumar Warunjikar in the Museum of Bombay High Court. There he showed us the various original Charters issued by the Queen and original Court registers used by English Judges which are displayed in the museum. He also explained us the basic structure of the court working and also enlightened us about the structural specialities of the Court building. He also shared the information about various courts in session on that day and how one should behave while in the Court. We then attended various court proceedings and observed the way courts are conducted. According to their interest students chose the courts for observation. The courts observed were Original side Court, Court with Testamentary matters, court with Admiralty matters and Court with appellate side matters.

In the lunch break of the court, we had the privilege of meeting Justice Dhanuka in his chambers. It was one of the experiences to cherish for lifetime. He shared his wisdom with us and encouraged us to enjoy the process of becoming lawyer.

Post lunch we visited the Judge's library which is a huge collection of books used by the Judges. It has a separate room of Bare Acts. The amount of different kind of Acts displayed there gave us the picture about how vast our Legal system is. We also saw some original copies of rare books preserved in the Library.

The Court room where Gangadhar Tilak was tried and proclaimed his historic words "Swaraj is my birth right and I shall have it" was one of the attractions of the visit but unfortunately that room was undergoing some changes so couldn't be accessed. However it was compensated when we saw the statue of Justice Chagla at the centre of the Court building.

Although we couldn't get enough of the place, we left Mumbai by Deccan Queen to Pune with our hearts full of encouragement. A Lawyer is never born unless and until he becomes aware of strength of the Legal system and this visit exactly did the same!

At the end of the visit, the predominant mood & expression on face of each of our students was like *'Though this what I always dreamt to be in my life, but even its glimpse is enough for me now to do whatever it takes to reach here, and now that I have seen it through my own eyes and have breached the aroma, and felt the majesty of this Temple of Justice and the Guardian of Our Constitution, and the aura and grandeur of these saggy Black Robes being flaunted all around us!'*

The Supreme Court of India Building is one of independent India's first major buildings to be designed by an Indian Architect.

We also visited the **Supreme Court Museum**, and there on display are the rare Artefacts, Manuscripts, old documents, and Photographs depicting the Legal Heritage of India and the growth of our Justice Delivery System, the depiction of the evolution and development of the Judiciary in India from Ancient Times to the British Colonial Period, and the development of the Federal Court and the Supreme Court through unique items of that period.

Visit to NHRC: After a succulent and delicious lunch at Gujarat Bhavan, we headed for the National Human Rights Commission Head Quarters and were greeted by the concerned official (Training & Research Department) Mr. Pankaj Kumar and we were given PowerPoint

Presentations on Organisational Structures and various Departments and working of NHRC, the Process Flow of each Complaint to NHRC & its culmination, Repository of Data and Analysis & Research for further Actions & Recommendations, and we also had a very informative and interactive Session with the concerned Official (Investigation Dept), DSP Mr. L.R. Kurillose.

Visit to India Gate: Before heading to our Hotels for a halt, we did stop by the India Gate on Rajpath, and we had a fabulous time to take photos and selfies at the backdrop of majestic India Gate in a fun filled atmosphere of pleasant evening full of visitors from all across India.

Day 2 (Friday, 08th March 2019)

Visit to Parliament of India: In the morning we visited the Parliament of India and after a strict scrutiny of each individual at multiple times at each entrance points, we had an opportunity to take an informative Guided Tour of the inside of the Lok Sabha (Lower House of the Parliament), Rajya Sabha (Upper House of the Parliament) and saw the same from the Visitor's Gallery and got very interesting information from the concerned Govt. Official guiding us about the History, Seating Protocols, Working/Business and Roaster of Parliament, Voting on Bills/Mike Arrangements/Translation Booth therein etc, and we also visited the Central Hall in the Parliament where Joint Sessions etc, take place and where the Independence of India was proclaimed, and also where the First Prime Minister of Republic of India took an Oath of Office, and which unveils life-size portraits of legends of India.

Visit to Rashtrapati Bhavan & Mughal Gardens: We visited Rashtrapati Bhavan, Rashtrapati Bhavan Museum and Mughal Garden. Along with Rashtrapati Bhavan, one must not miss the opportunity to visit Rashtrapati Bhavan Musium at Gate No. 37. This place has quite a bit of art-crafts and historical evidences about the Rashtrapati Bhavan which made it an interesting visit. 3D holographic images of former President Abdul Kalam and Pranav Mukharji is the main attraction of visitors. We were amazed to see sprawling Mughal Garden and especially Rose Garden & Fountains over there, after a strict scrutiny of each individual at the entrance.

Visit to Akshardham Swaminarayan Temple: Before heading to our Hotel for a halt, we visited the famous Akshardham Swaminarayan Temple. Akshardham Temple is a brilliant masterpiece of Marble Carvings depicting the great Ancient Indian Architecture. We watched a scintillating Laser & Musical Fountain Show, Hall of Values depicting life-like robotic displays of life of Swaminarayan, and a theme based Cultural Boat Ride.

Day 3 (Saturday, 09th March 2019)

Visit to Taj Mahal, Agra: In the morning we started our journey from Delhi to Taj Mahal, Agra. We reached at noon at Agra. We visited the world-famous Taj Mahal, Agra. It is declared as the World Heritage Site. We had a fabulous time taking loads of Group Photos and selfies in the backdrop of this truly majestic mausoleum. Thereafter the lunch and some rest, we started the overnight long-haul journey from Agra to Amritsar.

Day 4 (Sunday, 10th March 2019)

In the memory of Late Mrs. Indira Gandhi, known as the stealthy lady of India, her place of Official Residence as the then Prime Minister of India, has now been converted into a Memorial Museum. The creation of Bangladesh, the ending of the Privy Purse, the Nationalisation of Banks, and the imposition of emergency are some of the historic events that are attributed to Mrs. Indira Gandhi. The Museum preserves and displays collection of rare photographs of the Nationalist movement, of the personal moments of the Nehru-Gandhi family, of her childhood. The photographs, newspaper articles and clippings related to the assassination of Mrs. Indira Gandhi's and also the assassination of her son and former Prime Minister of India Mr. Rajeev Gandhi and his funeral pyres, and the awards and gifts received by her from various Heads of States, and personal objects like her clothes, pens, and bags, and books are also part of the collection.

Shopping at Sarojini Nagar: Thereafter we enjoyed the shopping at Sarojini Nagar Shopping Malls followed by a delicious lunch and some rest.

Following are the activities conducted and participated by the volunteers of NSS in this academic year:

Tree Plantation :

- Tree Plantation activity was organized in collaboration with Fergusson College on 1st June 2019 in Fergusson College Campus. Pune Municipal Corporation Mayor Hon'ble Mukta Tilak was present at the event. In this event, 250 trees were planted by the students. As the Government of Maharashtra is taking initiative to raise the number of trees in our state, this was our college's contribution for the same as social responsibility.

International Day of Yoga :

- International day of yoga is celebrated on 21st June every year to spread awareness about the importance and effects of yoga on the health of the people. National Seminar and Bill Analysis Competition Report – 2017-18

National Seminar on “Sports Law in India: Issues & Challenges” & National Bill Analysis Competition 5th and 6th March 2018.

About the Seminar

Not only in India but globally, legal regulation of sporting world has become extremely necessary. Sports are played at national and international levels. General Assembly of United Nations has adopted resolution 58/5, which recognises sport and physical education as a means to promote education, health, development and peace. Sports also promote careers and entertainments leading to requirement of regularly measures.

Sports law is an amalgam of laws that apply to athletes and the sports they play. It is not a single legal topic with generally applicable principles. Sports law touches on a varieties of matter including contract, tort, trade mark, agency, antitrust, constitutional law, labour, sex discrimination, criminal and tax issues. There is a huge interest in sports, both on and off the field. The growing media coverage of highly paid athletics, advertising endorsement has let to various legal issues surrounding the sports industry. Sports law is a vital part to sports. There need to be a strong presence of good governance and someone to uphold the rules of game when they come into disrepute.

This National Seminar was organized as an endeavour towards focusing these gray areas related to sport and law. We hope its outcome will be in the interest and benefit of stakeholders such as sport persons, sports organisations, regulatory bodies, lawyers, numerous sport loving Indians and overall development of sports law jurisprudence.

Sub-themes

Dispute resolution in Sports in India

The nature of dispute in Sports is different and it needs a special approach to resolve amicably. Traditional courts are incapable to resolve sports disputes from that perspective, and more importantly they cannot decide the dispute in speedy manner. Resolving a dispute in a very short stipulated time is what expected from dispute resolution system. Variety of disputes can occurred in sports such as issues related to its governance, purely commercial, contractual, disciplinary, discrimination and few are even of a quasi-criminal nature. India needs to have a mechanism with well framed regulations to resolve sports dispute.

Present Regulatory Governance and issues

The current Indian model of sports governance has various stakeholders such as the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, the Indian Olympic Association, the State Olympic Associations, the National Sports Federation and the Sports Authority of India with well defined roles. Sports Associations are not free from allegations of politics, miss governance, discrimination, corruption and so on. The issue of 'governance' needs to be studied on the backdrop of Supreme Court intervention and its decision of appointing 'Committee of Administrators' (COA), which currently running the administration of the national cricket body.

Anti-doping measures

'International Convention against Doping in Sport' in the year 2005 represents the first time that governments around the world have agreed to apply the force of international law to anti-doping. India ratified the said convention on 10th September, 2007. This is important because there are specific areas where only governments possess the means to take the fight against doping forward.

Legal Approach towards Sports in India

In recent years, the State efforts are visible in the form of appointing committees such as Justice Mudgal Committee and draft Bills such as 'National Sports Development Bill, 2013', The National Sports Ethics Commission Bill, 2016, The National Sports University Bill, 2017 etc. Legal framework will provide crucial support in the overall development of sports in India. Considering the complexity involved, we must check the feasibility of having legislation, covering all the legal issues related to sports.

Conduct Of Sessions

Dispute resolution in Sports in India

Resource Person: Shri. Shivam Singh, Advocate, Supreme Court of India, New Delhi

Shri. Shivam Singh inaugurated the Seminar and Bill Analysis Competition. In this session, he elaborated on nature of disputes in sports with live examples. He also gave an overview of role of a law and advocate in resolving sports dispute. He explained how arbitration can be used to resolve sports disputes.

Present Regulatory Governance and issues

Resource Person: Shri. Uday Warunjikar, Sr. Advocate, Bombay High Court, Mumbai.

Shri. Warunjikar spoke on the various issues affecting the sports association such as politics, miss governance, discrimination, corruption and hence there is a need to have strong regulatory governance in the field of sports law. He also focused on Australian model and suggested to have similar mechanism in India.

Anti-doping measures

Resource Person: Mr. Nitin Mittal, Associate, Krida-Legal, New Delhi

Mr. Mittal in this session explained and analysed the meaning of word 'anti-doping'. First he gave few real life examples how doping (drugs) affects the athletes and the reputation of the country and dealt with anti-doping measures. He also spoke on international conventions, India's obligations and NADA. He elaborated on the statutory procedural aspect in detailed manner.

Legal Approach towards Sports in India

Resource Person: Mr. Vidusphat Singhania, Partner, Krida-Legal, New Delhi

Mr. Singhania, who was one of the members of drafting committee of National Sport Development Bill 2013, discussed the efforts taken by the State for taking Sports law seriously and by appointing various committees and drafting bills such as National Sport Development Bill 2013, the National Sports Ethics Commission Bill 2016 and National Sports University Bill 2017. He spoke on the differences and the effects of the bills.

Valedictory Session:

The National Seminar and Bill Analysis Competition were concluded with the valedictory session. Valedictory session was presided over by Chief Guest, Mr. Vidusphat Singhania, Partner, Krida-Legal, New Delhi. and Dr. Rohini Honap, Principal.

About the Bill Analysis Competition:

'The National Sports Ethics Commission Bill, 2016' was given to the participants for analysis. Students from all over India participated in the competition. Preliminary round was conducted on 5th March and judges for the preliminary round were Shri Shirish Kulkarni, Assistant Professor, SLS and Shri. Rohan Mirpuri, Advocate, Bombay High Court.

Final round of the competition was conducted on 6th March. Four participants qualified the final round. Judge for the final round was Adv. Abhay Apte, President, Maharashtra Cricket Association. Four colleges reached to the final were

The curriculum focuses more on the theoretical aspects of law & therefore to fill up the void of practical approaches, all the faculty members have adapted various traditional as well as digital teaching aids for the effective delivery of lectures.

The teaching methods incorporated by faculty members are mostly Problem Solving, Case Study, Interactive Discussion and Presentation Along With Traditional Lecture Methods. The use of ICT is also possible due to projectors mounted in the class rooms. The audio-visual aids help for the delivery of complex & abstract topics. The methods inclusive of constructive, collaborative, integrative, and reflective & inquiry based learning approaches are adapted by all the faculty members to reach out heterogeneous group of students. This mechanism helps to facilitate a better outcome of the teaching learning & evaluation process.

For Family Law I a classroom activity was conducted on 2nd August, 2019 in 3rd BA LLB DIV A. This activity saw the participation of 41 students present who actively engaged in a legal discussion concerning Section 10 of the Hindu Marriage Act, 1955.

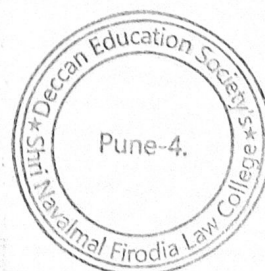
Management Subjects were taught using digital teaching methods. Law Teachers employed pedagogy suited to their subject.

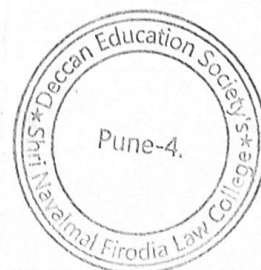
